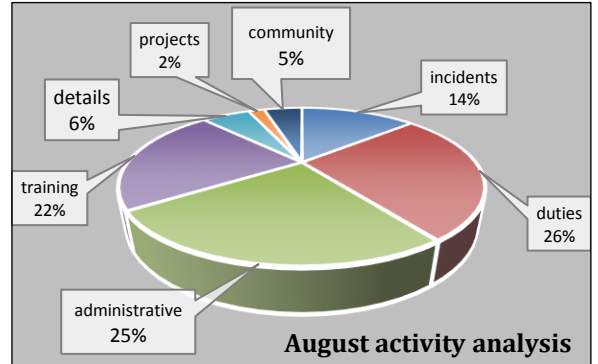

Fire/EMS Service Delivery

Incident Report (2016 total to-date incidents: **315**)

AUGUST 2016: **36 incident calls** ... 15 incident hours

- EMS – 10
- Fire – 7 (structure 1, vehicle 2, trash 1, alarm 3)
- Service – 15 (wellness 1, gas leak 2, invalid assist 8, detail 1, smoke detector 1)
- MVA – 3
- Rescue – 0
- Invalid Assist – 8
- HAZMAT – 0
- Cancellations - 1



Department Notables

Operations

- The average number of incidents per month/year continues to trend higher. Medical incidents continue to be the majority of our responses (see above August statistics). The frequency of woodland and structure fires increases when the EPA-regulated burn ban is lifted October 1 and during colder months.

Training

- “Multi-story interior fire attack” tactical training at Serenbe on Sept 13, 14, 15 by Chattahoochee Hills, Palmetto and Fairburn fire departments ... the Serenbe Textile Lofts at 10625 Serenbe Lane is the department’s first multi-level (3+ stories) building requiring the departments to adapt with more specialized training and equipment



Chief’s Office

- The Fire Chief is participating as a neighboring jurisdiction “partner” in Coweta County Fire Departments’s 2016 strategic planning during September



- LT Tom Kuglin attained “Georgia Chief Fire Officer” certification from the Georgia Association of Fire Chiefs.
- The 2016 Multijurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, with Chattahoochee Hills’ own unique component, was approved by FEMA without revisions. The city’s requisite involvement and the overall plan qualifies Chattahoochee Hill’s to receive compensatory funding for disaster-related expense.

- The 9-11 Memorial Service was well-attended on the 15th anniversary of the terrorist attacks on the United States.
- The Fire Chief participated in a Homeland Security training session for “Incident Command Preparedness for Active Shooter”
